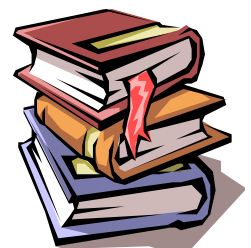
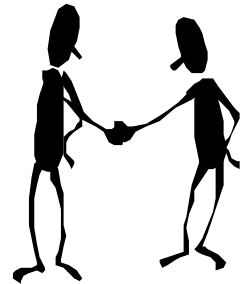

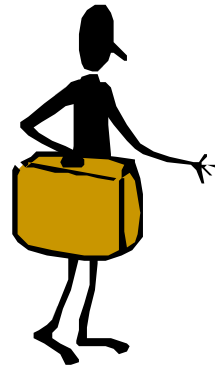

## THOUGHTS ON THE 50<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF THE ORDINATION OF WOMEN

This year at Annual Conference we marked the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ordination of women, as did all of the other annual conferences in United Methodism. The highlight of the recognition was on Sunday morning with a worship service that featured the Rev. Carol Johns as preacher. All of the ordained women of this annual conference came forward and sang for the conference. It was an amazing and awe-inspiring sight. In a visual reinforcement of Rev. Johns' sermon emphasis, "Step By Step", the women placed their shoes around the communion table. The United Methodist church has taken many steps, but we have so many steps to go.

I have to admit that I sat on the pew with a smug smile upon my face. Approximately 20% of the ordained clergy in the Detroit Annual Conference are women. On the Detroit East District 41% of the ordained clergy are women. The issue is competency, not gender. To clear the path to competency, however, gender has been (and still is in a few unenlightened churches) an issue.

I am writing these thoughts prior to Memorial Day Weekend. Most of my growing up years was spent in a western suburb of Indianapolis, Indiana. Memorial Day weekend was not only spent in visiting a cemetery to honor the women and men of this nation who lost their lives in military, but it was also the time for the Indy 500. On the Sunday before Memorial Day I spent hours in front of the radio listening to the race. Over the years the loud roar of the front engine Offenhauser gave way to the irritating whine of the rear engine Lotus.

Decades later a change was introduced – the introduction of the first female driver, Janet Guthrie. She qualified, finished the race, competed in other races, but she never materialized as a potential winner of the Indy 500. Last year a young woman by the name of Danika Patrick was one of the top qualifiers, actually led the race for a few laps, and has the skills to eventually win this race as well as many other races.

It was distressing to note that one of the other drivers cried foul even before the race began. He said that her weighing less than the other drivers created a disadvantage for all of the men. Now if we were counting all the disadvantages that have been afforded to women down through the history of car racing, I would imagine that Ms. Patrick has more than one advantage due her.

For me words such as age, race, and sex are descriptive words that celebrate the uniqueness of an individual. Yet when we add the suffix of "ism" to each of these words we experience the reality and ugliness of prejudice, both personally and institutionally. The psychology of prejudice is quite simple. In order for some people to feel superior, they project feelings of inferiority upon others.

In his book *The Haunt of Grace* Ted Loder writes: "It goes like this: he acts like a man, she reacts like a woman, and there you have it. He's white, she's African American, and that explains it. He's a clergy, a social worker, she's a lawyer, a doctor, he's a democrat, she's a republican, he's gay, she's divorced, and that's the size of it. In the process of turning others into objects, we do the same to ourselves without realizing it."

I think that people treat other people as objects in order to subdue, tame, manipulate and control the relationship (or to preserve the lack of a relationship) that exists between them. Instead of treating others as an object that revolves around the center of our personal universe, they should become the subjects to whom we gravitate in order to expand a shared universe. This allows us to no longer be concerned about who is "in" and who is "out." Rather, we are all "in," daring to be real with each other.

I rejoice that women are "in" the ordained ministry. Thanks be to God for the wholeness of mutual ministry. Now if we could open that door a little wider...

vocation, this gathering is for you.

Participants will attend two workshops. Workshops are divided into two categories -"Dive In" and "Make Waves". "Dive In" workshops are for those in the process of discerning their call into ordained ministry. "Make Waves" workshops are for those who are committed to entering the candidacy process, or are already certified candidates, and are ready to go deeper. Every effort will be made to honor your top two choices

The General Board of Higher Education and Ministry (GBHEM) is underwriting most of the cost of the event. Participants pay travel expenses and \$150 registration fee, which includes two nights at the Hyatt Regency, all event meals (Friday dinner—Sunday breakfast), and all EXPLORATION events.
